Role of Nonprofit Board Members

Manage CEO/Executive Director.

Ensure:

- Adequate financial resources.
- Wise use of assets.
- Work aligns with mission.
- Adherence to laws, regulations, bylaws.

Monitor programs and services.

Disclose conflicts of interest.

Serve as ambassador.

Recruit and orient new members.

Base selection on board needs.

Invite new members who will meet needs.

Start with committee service.

Consider the four C's:

- Culture
- Character
- Connections
- Competency

Start with Good Recruiting

Engaged board members complete duties and fulfill expectations. They are strong ambassadors, strategists, and supporters. Enhanced board Increased Better public Greater impact relations opportunities recruitment

Primary Reasons for Disengagement

Lack understanding of expectations

Poor communications

Disconnected from the work and one another

Concerned about accessing personal relationships

Fear asking for money

Feels time is wasted



Discuss expectations during recruitment, onboarding, and at meetings.

Share job descriptions with time and activity commitments.



Set individual goals with each member, focusing on skills and interests.

Fear Asking for Money







Everyone can contributenetworkers, cultivators, solicitors, stewards. Coordinate outreach to local leaders and the media.

Ask to posts on social media. Provide text and images.

Feels Time is Wasted-Board Meetings

Focus on big picture.

Use a consent agenda.

- Send materials one week before meeting.
- Agenda- items are specific, relevant, actionable.
- Minutes from the last meeting.
- Financial reports.
- Background information for approvals.

Share topic for conversation.
